Minutes of the meeting of Project Approval Board held on 1st March 2006 to consider SSA & NPEGEL, AWP&B for 2006-07 of Karnataka

The PAB meeting to consider Karnataka's AWP&B for 2006-07 under SSA and NPEGEL was held on 1st March 2006 under the Chairpersonship of Secretary (EE&L)

2. The list of participants who attended the meeting is given in Annex-1.

3. Status

(a)

At the outset, the Secretary, Department of Primary and Secondary Education, Government of Karnataka briefed the PAB on the status of the progress made in Karnataka. He stated that the State complied with the commitments made in the last year except the following: -

1. Courted

Single Teacher Schools – Due to resource constraints, the State has taken a policy decision to the effect that wherever less than 20 children are available, there is no need to appoint another teacher for those schools and these schools will remain as single teacher schools.

All children in school - The State achieved very close to the goal of enrolment of all children in school/AIE centres. The number of out of school children reported in the two surveys conducted by SRI-IMRB and ASER is almost the same.

Street children – A separate plan for the street children/deprived urban children in Bangalore urban area has been prepared. The focus areas on out of school children is now in backward areas.

Quality – Quality level is low in the State. Strategies have been provided in the plan to improve the quality of education in the State. As a first step towards this, construction of around 24090 additional classrooms has been proposed in the current year itself.

State's presentation

Thereafter, the State Project Director made a brief presentation on the progress of SSA programme in the State. The highlights of his presentation are given below:

- (i) The enrolment of children of 6-14 years age group has touched 88.80 lakh during 2005-06 compared to 87 lakhs during 2004-05.
- (ii) The equity index on gender reached 0.9783 compared to 0.9754 in 2002-03.
- (iii) Drop-out rate reduced from 11.18% to 6.99% at primary level and from 32.93% to 13.99% at upper primary level in 2001-02 and 2005-06 respectively.
- (iv) The out of school children reduced from 10.22 lakh in 2001 to 1.48 lakh in 2006. Child census 2005, ASER 2005 and IMRB 2005 data on out of school

children is consistent. The State is in the top second or third position in the country in enrolling children into school.

(v) 58 KGBVs opened in the Educationally Backward Blocks (EBBs).

- (vi) During 2005-06, every teacher has been trained for 17 trainee days till January 2006. Teachers training is proposed to be taken up through EDUSAT. Installation of Ku band ROTs are taken up in all 27 DIETs and 176 BRCs through SSA.
- (vii) Assessment done for Class II, V and VII covering 21.62 lakh students.

(viii) Initiated outcome based supervision, monitoring and inspections.

(ix) An innovative programme called Chinnara Karnataka Darshana was launched in 2004-05 covering 10,100 children of 202 blocks. 15500 children are being covered during 2005-06 under this programme.

(x) Computer assisted learning centre started in 766 schools. Another 351

schools will be covered during 2005-06.

(xi) 606 inclusive education resource teachers are placed at block level. Out of 129491 CWSN identified, 1212613 are in school. 56322 teachers are trained, 11654 children are given assistive devices and 9985 schools have ramps.

(xii) Under civil works, block and district level engineers provide technical guidance to SDMCs, 3rd party technical agencies appointed for quality assurance, detailed working drawings and construction manual for

community construction provided to SDMCs.

(xiii) Under REMS, the achievement so far is action research, lab area & multi centric studies and the engagement of Karnataka School Quality Assessment Organisation (KSQAO) for quality education assessment.

(xiv) Preference given to backward, minority and SC concentrated districts by redeployment of 524 teachers, SWASTHH plus in Gulbarga and Raichur, Edu. Sat in Gulbarga, remedial teaching, residential bridge courses and girls education.

(xv) Salient features of the plan for 2006-07 are focus on children like migrant, CWSN, street children, quality improvement, learning improvement, urban deprived children, filling infrastructure gap, full coverage of all out of school children, prioritization of minority, SC and focus districts and continuing and strengthening the activities that have proved successful during previous year.

(xvi) SSA programme is being implemented through convergence with other

departments and NGOs.

(xvii) Re-appropriation carried out in terms of Para 86 of the Manual with ECs

approval.

(xviii) The points of discussion are opening of BRCs as educational blocks, upgradation of teacher posts as head-teachers, follow up interventions based on KSQAO reports on quality and scholarship of girls (SC, ST and minority) in NEK districts.

While the entire civil works proposed for 7 special focus districts of (b) Bidar, Dakshina Kannada, Dharwad, Gulbarga, Kolar, Raichur and Uttar Kannada and 4 backward districts of Bagalkote, Bellary, Bijapur and Koppal was allowed, whereas in the case of remaining Districts, 50% of the infrastructure gap reported in the DISE data was allowed. The total civil works for SSA Karnataka for 2006-07 comes to 52.57%.

9 Million plus City

Bangalore Metro city is the million plus city in the State. Bangalore metro city plan with an outlay of Rs. 479.43 lakhs indicating the strategies for the education of 6796 urban deprived children was proposed and included in the Bangalore Urban district plan. The strategies proposed are opening of evening schools, mobile computer learning centres, residential schools, mobile libraries, shelter facilities and rehabitation centres, community based coaching centres, residential camps, accelerated reading programme and community sensitization and mobilization of resources. While the education of these urban deprived children is factored into the out of school strategies, other activities are factored into the management cost of Bangalore urban district plan subject to the ceiling of 6% of the total outlay.

10 KGBV

58 KGBVs opened in the Educationally Backward Blocks of the state. 3912 eligible girls, (SC-1405, ST-654, OBC-556, minority-286 and Others-1011) have been enrolled in these KGBVs.

12. Commitments

The State Government made the following commitments to improve the implementation of SSA in the State:

- (i) All out of school children will be covered during 2006-07.
- (ii) The drop out rate will be brought down to zero by 2007.
- (iii) The State will take steps to increase Gross Enrolments of children of SC, ST' categories in 2006-07.
- (iv) The State has 3033 single teacher schools. Immediate steps should be taken to provide another teacher, wherever more than 20 children are studying in such a school.
- (v) There will be no schools without blackboards after 2006-07.
- (vi) The State will complete all pending civil works by June 2006.
- (vii) The State should ensure 100% access to primary schooling.
- (viii) The State should develop and operationalize school monitoring indices for measuring functioning of schools by 2006-07.
- (ix) Quarterly pupil evaluation outcomes to be measured and reported in NCERT Monitoring Tools by July'06.

(x) The State should ensure the enhancement of achievement levels of children of class V by 10 % above the DISE level of 2005-06.

13. Re-appropriation of funds

An excess expenditure of Rs. 284.76 lakh was reported in 20 districts during 2005-06 under out of school children strategies (Rs.127.10 lakh), teacher's salary (Rs.19.02 lakh) and management cost (Rs. 138.64 lakh) and the same is proposed for re-appropriation from out of school children strategies (Rs.66.17 lakh), remedial teaching/management cost (Rs.10.53 lakh), management cost (Rs.10.53 lakh) and utilization of unspent balance (Rs.156.45 lakh) as detailed in Annex-IV. It is not possible to re-appropriate funds from unutilized balances as proposed. Re-appropriation is possible from one intervention to another intervention provided saving is available. In the case of Mandya district the management cost exceed 6% of the outlay. The State should, therefore, take appropriate action to re-appropriate of funds in terms of Para 86 of the Manual on Financial Management and Procurement. In case re-appropriation is not possible under any of the intervention the State should specifically seek additional funds.

14. The PAB approved the AWP&B of Karnataka as under:

- (i) SSA: An outlay of Rs. 72704.588 lakh of which Rs.72299.488 lakh is fresh outlay and Rs. 405.10 lakh is the spill over.
- (ii) NPEGEL: An outlay of Rs. 1159.827 lakh without spill over.

Thus the total outlay approved by PAB is Rs. 73864.415 lakh.

The detailed State summary of costing of AWP&B 2006-07 and district-wise and intervention-wise allocation of outlay are given in Annex-V and Annex-VI respectively.

- 15. It was directed that the State should also satisfy the following conditions to avail of SSA funds:
 - (a) The State Government should give a written commitment for meeting its share of the SSA outlay.
 - (b) First installment of the State share should also be released to the State Society within one month of the releases of Central share to the State Society.
 - (c) At least 50% of the teachers recruited should be female.
 - (d) Teachers appointed against posts created through SSA funds should be made accountable to the VEC for at least the salary payment. The latter would monitor the attendance before releasing the salary.

- (e) VECs or equivalent bodies should be constituted and accounts opened to incur expenditure under teachers grant, civil works, maintenance grants, school grants and other such expenditures, which has to be incurred only through these bodies as per SSA norms.
- (f) The State Government will maintain their level of investment in elementary education as in 1999-2000 and give the details of this to GOI before the release of second installment. The contribution as State share for SSA will be over and above this investment.
- (g) The second installment would only be released after the previous installment of State share has been transferred to the State Implementation Society and substantial progress has been made in expenditure as far as money already released is concerned.
- (h) All appointments under the head of management cost should either be on deputation or on contract basis, with all persons being recruited having functional computer literacy.
